The Congregational Federation has been a valuable participant in the NIFEA processes and has produced this resource to enable local churches think about how we live gently together in God's world which is entrusted to our care.

Foreword from Rogate R Mshana

The New International Financial and Economic Architecture (NIFEA) and the role of churches



Today, more than a billion people living in poverty are denied and deprived of the basic human rights to the gifts of God's creation: food, water, shelter, etc. A number of us come from countries experiencing grinding poverty and hunger, where children are dying daily because of lack of food. For many countries, the millennium development goals of halving poverty by 2015 were far from being met.

And yet the world we live in today has never been wealthier. Global wealth grew to US\$120 trillion in 2010 or an increase of 20 percent from 2007 (just before the global financial crisis). In ten years, the rich increased their wealth from USD 32.8 trillion in 2008 to 70.2 trillion in 2017. This wealth is expected to reach 100 trillion in 2025 (US Today.com).

So, the world has never been more unequal. Presently, only 8 men own the same wealth as 3.6 billion people who make up the poorest half of humanity. Meanwhile, the poorest half of the global population possesses merely 3.7 percent of global riches and the poorest ten percent has scarcely one thousandth of global wealth, translating to a lack of access to basic needs necessary for survival and a dignified life. This is contrary to God's vision of an Economy of Life.

Ecumenical studies and consultations including the Sao Paulo Conference on a New International Financial and Economic Architecture (NIFEA) organized by the CWM, WCRC and WCC in Brazil in 2012 point out that the current experience of impoverishment and inequality has been and continues to be shaped by an unjust and unsustainable financial and economic architecture driven by greed.

If we do not address the urgent need for equity in production, consumption, investment and distribution of goods and services at various levels when planning our economies, gender injustice, poverty, marginalization, climate change, indebtedness, bubbles and crashes will persist.

The role of churches

"I came so that they may have life and have it abundantly" said Jesus. Churches are called in the name of mission to work for an economy in the service of life where poverty is eradicated, social justice is embraced and ecological justice promoted. NIFEA colloquia have helped churches to work out programs in addressing the issues mentioned.

With the completion of the 11 CWM NIFEA colloquia, churches have begun implementing new programs and others are improving the on-going ones following their NIFEA action plans. They expressed the need to have further theological education on Economy of Life. The CWM is therefore looking into the possibility of developing a curriculum on Theological Education on Economy of Life (TEEL).

Introduction

Since January 2017 the Congregational Federation have been involved with a Council for World Mission (CWM) project called NIFEA (New International Financial and Economic Architecture) to reflect on and help to tackle the critical challenges of economic, social and ecological injustice.

There have been three meetings on 'An Economy of Life', being part of the global life affirming movement that seeks to order our world that all may have life in all its fullness (John 10 v 10).

Presentations and discussions at each meeting has been regionally focussed but based on the backdrop of the new global reality of a Trump presidency in the USA and Britain's decision to exit from the European Union. Whatever our personal views on this, these kinds of things affect the global economy and world politics.

Topics that have been explored within each meeting and were affirmed in the Kingston Declaration¹ have included:

- Money, Banking and investments
- **Eco-church**
- **Ethics**
- **Fair Trade**
- **Poverty**

The work aimed to influence financial and economic policy decision-makers towards poverty eradication and ecological justice. It also aims to enable churches to initiate specific activities to promote local economies and care for the environment.

In a call from within the Congregational Federation churches for resources, we have produced this booklet full of biblical reflections and worship material which we hope you will enjoy, share and enable you to challenge economic, social and ecological injustice where you are. Each reflection contains a quote from the Kingston Declaration which can be downloaded in full from the Congregational Federation website.

We want this booklet to raise awareness of the financial inequalities in the world, the ecological crisis and economic changes.

Our prayer is that you are drawn closer to God and are empowered into action to make change, so more people can live life in all its fullness.



Gathering activity

Who is your neighbour? You could discuss this at church after a service next Sunday and see what you and others think? Perhaps it is someone you live near and socialise with, or someone you rely on for your daily needs – like a girl on a farm in Ethiopia who helps to harvest your coffee, or someone you see on the news and share a compassionate thought for?

The CF have been active over the last few years in a partnership with Christian Aid to support for girls in Ethiopia and El Salvador. It has been a great team effort and has reached its fundraising goal. Just because someone lives in another country, it doesn't mean they are not our neighbours. Caring for others whether they live next door or the other side of the world.

Jesus says 'you shall..' which implies that he means it strongly – 'shall' has a commanding assertive quality to it, to make an intention in us to do something. I wonder.... what we shall do next?

I wonder ...

As the Revd King so rightly says, before we finish breakfast, we have depended on half the world! How do we ensure that as a consumer of everyday items, that we are supporting the farmers and producers? Fairtrade is one way we can do this.

The Bible passage tells us that God will bless us with rain and we will be blessed from our labour if we are righteous; that we will be able to offer hospitality and offerings to many nations but borrow from no-one. If we actioned what the Bible said, the world would be perfect – in this passage we have a combination of instruction and guidance.

It might be relatively easy to see how we can do the first part of this – by keeping God's commandments about our own work, we can stay on the right track – but we are relying on produce and labour of the rest of the world. If we do not act graciously and kindly to those producers and farmers, we are taking from them and benefitting from their labour, without fair recompense. If you put it another way, we are borrowing from them in an exploitative way, and not giving back a fair price. Fairness is not taking more than you need.

How can we do this if we do not know who grows and harvests food and drink that we rely on each day? Fairtrade is one way we can ensure that as consumers we act in a fair, kind and righteous way.

Do

The Fairtrade website says – "With Fairtrade you have the power to change the world every day. With simple shopping choices you can get farmers a better deal. That means they can make their own decisions, control their future and lead the dignified life everyone deserves."

Why not work towards becoming a Fairtrade church⁷?

Use Fairtrade tea and coffee after services and in all meetings for which you have responsibility

Move forward on using other Fairtrade products such as sugar, biscuits and fruit

Promote Fairtrade during Fairtrade Fortnight and during the year through events, worship and other activities whenever possible

Share

Set up an event for Fairtrade Fortnight at your church – this is usually during last week of February and first week of March. You could use a map and create an all age activity to plot where the items you are sharing and eating come from, pray for the farmers and producers for a good harvest and ask your worship leader to regularly include prayers for Fairtrade farmers.

Prayer

Lord, forgive our silence. Forgive our reluctance to speak up for others. Forgive our reliance on goods which have been produced unfairly at the expense of the poor. Forgive our lack our awareness of how our clothes are manufactured, our food produced and our mistaking unneeded goods for essentials. Lord enter the silence of our hearts and lift them up with fresh understanding derived from the Wisdom contained in your Word. May we be ambassadors for Christ in bringing reconciliation between producer and consumer, those exploited and those who benefit from their exploitation. Ethical choices are an everyday



Our existing economic architecture is intricately intertwined. This enmeshing began in Empire, in the period of resource extraction founded upon the labour of slaves. This colloquium brings us face to face with the colonial relationships of the past and the modern forms of slavery that arise in the Empire of the present. We commit to intentional engagement with each other, and across our regions, that is both honest and fully open to hear.8

Gathering activity

We make ethical choices all the time, although we may not always think of it this way. Speaking about 'ethical choices' makes it sound grand, as if this is just about major decisions with wide reaching impact on lots of people. But there are issues of injustice, exploitation and unfairness all around us. In fact, if we are faced with an ethical or moral issue, even a 'small' one, and we decide

not to say anything, not to get involved, not to make a decision – then we have just made an ethical choice.

I wonder ...

Are we not letting God down if we fail to talk to him in prayer, before we make them, all our significant choices in life, and certainly all those which impact on others and on our planet?

Asking God for guidance and direction is part of walking humbly with him, and when he speaks to us and shows us his way, he will champion justice and mercy.

How incarnational is our faith if we don't approach ethical issues from the perspective that Jesus wants us to represent his embodied nature, the Word made flesh, in our society? He wants to live among us; he wants us to meet him in one another; he wants us to treat others as if they were him. How incarnational is our faith if we are not prepared to live and speak from the perspective that Jesus wants us to represent God's standards for life and society, standards of justice and mercy, since he is the Word made flesh?

It can be very difficult to speak about Christian values and principles in today's society, since, as we hear constantly, we are living in a 'post-Christian' age. However, is the ethical choice behind all other ethical choices not the choice to do just that? To take a stand for Jesus' values and perspectives even when this will be unpopular or considered part of the past?

Can we commit together to finding ways to avoid being turned into a Christian club that only talks to itself? Can we find a stronger voice to reach the communities around us? There is a spiritual and ethical choice to be made here.

Contact your local Council and ask them what particular communities in the locality are most at risk from issues of health, security or education. Doing this will mean making an ethical choice.

Contact churches in your locality to see what you could do together to make some degree of difference for the people in those communities. Go an extra mile for them. Here is a second ethical choice.

Lord, help me to really put you and your Kingdom first in my life. Help me to want to seek for your righteousness in everything I do, and in every relationship which I have.

Help me to have the courage and the grace to share your values and perspectives with others when it comes to making choices, whether those others are friends and neighbours or decision makers in local or national organisations.

Help me always to try to act justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with you. Help me always to encourage others to act justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with you.

I wonder ...

As the song asks, when will there be a harvest for the world? The planet is such a huge place with a population of over 7 billion women, men and children. We might ask how can we possibly ensure that each and every person, not one human being excluded, has a feeling of harvest and at least enough in their life? All great movements for change for the better begins with us – you and I caring and committing to reaping what we sow; not just in the literal sense of farming but in the sense of that which we give we get back. If we give more love, the world is a richer place; if we give more grace, the world is a more peaceful place; if we give more compassion then the world is more cherished.

If we act in a miserly or unkind way, we will reap the same kind of behaviour in return. If we have the courage and care to act in a kind and generous way we will be rewarded generously. Cultivating an 'attitude of gratitude' and loving our neighbour as ourselves reaps so much more harvest for us all. We benefit from a feel-good factor and those around feel more cared for and appreciated – good news and kind behaviour are contagious!

Paul was writing to the young church in Corinth and the whole of chapter 9 is about generous giving and with a joyful heart. He was talking about money and also all other ways we give, more importantly when we give of ourselves. And it wasn't something he wanted us to take lightly. He starts verse 6 with a note to the reader – remember this, he says. He is pointing us to something particular we need to act on, so, remember this:

If we want to cultivate a harvest for the world, then we need to think about our actions, as citizens, shoppers, church members, neighbours, parents, friends, workers... perhaps we could ask ourselves the simple question? Can something good grow from what I have done? Can someone flourish and thrive from what I have done? Cheerful giving transforms the giver and the whole earth. We reap what we sow, in our hometown and on our planet.

We hear again Jesus forcing us to choose between Caesar and God in the ordering of our money. We cannot affirm the accumulation of wealth as an end to be desired, we must desire an Economy of Life that desires life in all its fullness for all God's creation.¹⁷

I wonder ...

Why did Jesus talk so much about money? The widow's mite Luke 21:1-5; You cannot serve both God and money Matthew 6:24; The money lender Luke 51:43; The rich young man Matthew 19:16-22 and many more.

Money doesn't matter and yet it seems to have featured in Jesus' ministry a lot. Well of course it's not the money that matters, it's how we relate to it.

God loves us all whether we have a big bank balance or not, the story of the rich young man continues with the well-known saying about it being harder for a rich man to go to heaven than a camel going through the eye of a needle. The verse that is often overlooked, but perhaps one of the most important verses in the New Testament is Matthew 19-26; "with man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible" therefore through faith and trust in God it is possible to be much more ethically inclined than we are.

Jesus was shouting about corruption of second or third hand investments, is this what he was angry about? Not that money changers (bankers) existed, but that they had become corrupt to the point of using sacred ground to house their corruption?

The relationship between money and stealing is something that Jesus was trying to teach us. We all need money to survive in our society, but must we use it in such a way that we steal from others? This is a thought that would provoke many a protest in the banking world, but we only have to note the PPI scandal or extortionate banking charges, before we even consider the ethics of investment and what our money is actually promoting.

I wonder what the source of your income is?
I wonder what your attitude towards money is?

Session 6 Messy Harvest

Bible reference

Mark 4:26-29

How does this session help people grow in Christ?

This session is ideally presented at Harvest time, when the work of the scarecrow is complete, having watched over the crops from sowing to reaping. The parable of the growing seed helps us to think about the many ways in which God has watched over us from childhood, through both good and challenging times, even though we are often unaware of his presence.

Messy team theme

- Talk about childhood memories.
- Encourage sharing of life experiences/family/work/ hobbies.



Activity

You will need: thin garden canes; green garden tape; round polystyrene balls; cupcake cases; wool; eyes; peppercorns; raffia; material; ribbon; funky foam or material scraps; scissors; double-sided sticky tape or glue stick.

With two pieces of garden cane, form a cross approximately 30 cm x 22 cm and secure with green garden tape or sticky tape. Cut a piece of material 50 cm x 20 cm and double it over. Cut a small hole in the top centre and place it over the stick. Place a polystyrene ball on top and construct the head by securing hair (wool) and a hat (cupcake case) with double-sided tape or a glue stick. Stick on the eyes and peppercorn nose, and draw on a mouth. Make raffia hands and secure with sticky tape. Decorate the tunic with scraps of foam or material. Add a ribbon tie and a raffia belt.

Celebration

You might choose one of the following:

Retell Jesus' parable in your own words. Talk about the cross underneath the scarecrow's clothing and the way we are watched over as we grow to ripeness.

Tell a story of a time when you felt watched over and protected, then share Jesus' story and remind people of God's ever-present watchful love for each person.

Bring in half-grown seedlings and talk about what they have come from, what they might become and how they need nurturing throughout their existence; then talk about Jesus' parable and God's invisible presence.

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Session 7 MEGA GOD – micro me

Bible reference

Genesis 1:26-31

How does this session help people grow in Christ?

Although minuscule compared to the world, we are – each one of us – beautifully and uniquely created in the image of God, to be guardians of his amazing world. He knows us 'inside out', yet, despite our faults, trusts us to care for his creation. Each of us can make a difference.





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Messy team theme

- Talk about environmental issues: recycling, community projects, etc.
- Talk about travel: places people have visited, places on their bucket lists, cultural differences...
- Talk about food miles, countries where there is food shortage, food banks, soup kitchens, etc.

Activity

You will need: 'MEGA GOD – micro me' worksheets printed on medium or heavy-weight card; blue tissue paper, in different shades if possible; various seeds and lentils in small containers; all-purpose glue; glue spreaders; coloured pencils

Tear tissue paper into small pieces and paste on the sea areas of the worksheet. Glue seeds and lentils on the land mass. Draw yourself in the small box using coloured pencils.

Celebration

Read the passage and talk about being created 'in God's image'. Do we reflect his love in our everyday lives? Then choose one of the following:

Show a clip about Fairtrade (**youtube.com/ watch?v=PLKTGWH398Q**) or encourage interactive sharing about community projects; recycling centres; food banks; soup kitchens; shelters for the homeless.

Display a large world map or a globe. Give each person a Post-it note and invite them to write or draw a picture of their prayer for either a particular area/person or for a worldwide situation, then stick the notes on the map/globe. Pray over them.

Invite someone from a charitable/environmental organisation in your area to talk about the project in which they are involved.

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Creative Prayer Ideas²¹

Seed Prayers

You will need: seeds (herbs can be grown indoors throughout the year), potting compost, small plant pots.

Hold some seeds in your hand, think/talk about some of the issues facing farmers in the UK and across the world.

Maybe someone in your congregation is a farmer or knows a local farmer.

Imagine how it would feel to live as a farmer in different communities. What are the challenges you would face? What are the things you would be grateful for?

Play a quiet piece of background music and pray quietly for farmers, their communities and other farming across the world.

As a sign of your prayers plant the seeds in your hand into a pot. Nurture the plant, praying for farmers as they do this and as they enjoy their own small harvest.

Map Prayers

You will need: a large drawn or printed map of any country you wish to pray for maybe your own country or a country you have links with (this doesn't need to be detailed, an outline would be sufficient), post-it notes, pens.

Find out/think and talk about some of the issues facing the country you have chosen

Imagine how it would feel to live in a different community. What are the challenges you would face? What are the things you would be grateful for?

Move to the map and to write prayers on it for people, communities, businesses, wildlife. The prayers do not need to be long and could be drawn if preferred. Depending on the size of the map and the space around it, prayers could be written on post-it notes and then stuck on. When all the prayers have been made, end the prayer time by lifting them to God.



Modelling Clay Prayers

You will need: a piece of modelling clay for each person.

Share/think and talk about some of the issues facing yourself, your town or city, your country, or even the world. Highlight the challenges of climate change, the benefits of planting trees and flowers, the concerns about packaging and plastics. As you talk, invite the congregation to model something e.g. the sun, birds, tools, plants, people, coins. Invite everyone to turn to the person sitting next to them and to share their models. Then say a prayer together for the world.

Pray for all those who are living in poverty in the UK and abroad. May they find the help, support and advice they need to live well. Bless them with wisdom in spending and protect them from illness, crime and high interest loans. We pray for all those who work in helping other especially those with Christian Aid. Give the workers and the organisation the vision, the resources and the opportunities to change lives.

Tuesday

We thank God for the work of Fairtrade. We pray this work continues to be blessed so more farmers experience justice. Prompt us to buy and promote Fairtrade products wherever we go.

Wednesday

We pray for the world of banking and investments. We pray for moral and ethical values. We pray for all those who struggle with money either to manage it, earn it or spend it. We pray for those vulnerable in the world because of money especially those living in poverty, we pray protection, healing and strength for them.

Thursday

We pray for all those who look after our world, farmers, forests, conservationists. We pray for all those who promote caring and protecting our world. Provide them with the resources and skills they need. Help us to be more proactive in recycling, picking up litter, conserving energy and helping wildlife

Friday

We pray for world leaders and those in positions of power to change policies and make policies. We pray wisdom in decision making about climate change, trafficking, pollution, economy and conservation


Saturday
